Flying festival to hit the water

ALL things aeronautical will be celebrated at Rathmines this weekend.

The Catalina festival on Saturday (October 24) will celebrate the efforts to restore one of the

Catalina flying boats which were once a regular sight over Lake Macquarie. Catalina Flying Memorial Ltd has joined forces with the Lake Macquarie Historical Society and the Rathmines Catalina Memorial Park Trust to have the plane permanently housed at the Rathmines airbase. Philip Dulhunty, of the Catalina Flying Memorial, said Catalina seaplanes played a vital role in protecting Australia during World War II.

"During World War II, Rathmines was the southern hemisphere's largest flying boat base and was home to many of the 168 RAAF Catalinas during and after WWII," he said.

"Few Catalinas exist in the world today, but we were lucky enough to acquire one in Portugal earlier this year. The Memorial is currently restoring her at Bankstown airport in Sydney and hopes to fly the Catalina to Rathmines for ANZAC Day next year. "Our eventual aim is to have the people of Lake Macquarie and tourists alike enjoy flights over the lake in a rare Catalina flying boat, while preserving a vital part of Australian history."

The program for Saturday's festival will include a flypast by an 11 Sqn P3-C Orion, the seaplanes present on the day and DH 82 Tiger Moths and other vintage aircraft, courtesy of the Luskintigers.

There will also be displays, including WWII army vehicles and guns, Irish and tap dancers, choirs, children's amusements, stalls, food vans, camel rides and vintage cars and bikes.
